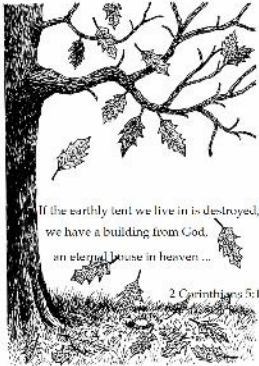

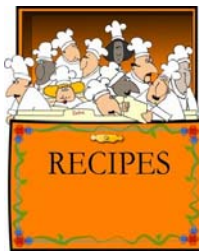

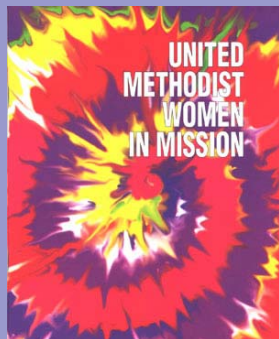

Childcare will be available with pre-registration. It will not be available without advanced notice.

Bring your children to the Annual Celebration! The [registration form](#) includes an area to register your children for a children's session with movie, study, craft, and pizza lunch (kindergarten through age 12) or the celebration with snack and lunch (age 13 and older).

Remember the needy! Bring these items to the Annual Celebration: paper products (tissues, toilet paper, paper towels), personal care items (shampoo, deodorant, toothpaste, toothbrushes, alcohol-free mouthwash, tampons, sanitary pads, diapers), cleaning supplies, etc. These items, which cannot be purchased with food stamps, will be sorted and evenly distributed to the districts before departure. The items will be taken to a shelter within each district.

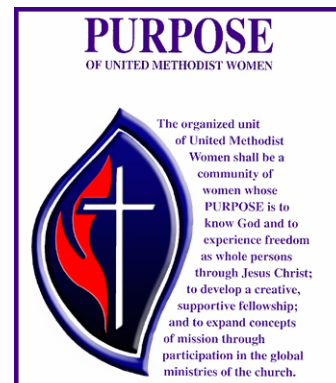


Registration forms available for pickup on the United Methodist Women bulletin board (outside the upstairs parlors).

Social Action News

The Conference United Methodist Women social action focus for this year is poverty. The "2 Cents a Meal" Ministry is part of the Hunger Network in Ohio founded in 1978. It is governed by a board of trustees from the Ohio based conferences of the United Methodist Church, Evangelical Lutheran Church, Presbyterian Church (USA) and United Church of Christ. East Ohio

Conference of the United Methodist Church has issued a call to Prayer, Pennies and Commitment and support for the "2 Cents a Meal" Ministry.

The brochure states that in Ohio over one and one-half million persons (more than 13% of the population) are living in poverty and experiencing "food insecurity." Over 300,000 Ohioans are chronically hungry, 1/3 of whom are below the age of eighteen with one in six children going to bed hungry or at risk of hunger every night.

The program is set up for churches, but other organizations could adopt the procedures and forward the donations if they are interested. The procedure is that participating persons (or families) donate two cents for every meal. The administrative organization collects this money and sends in the money. The money is divided evenly between the Church Hunger Project and the Hunger Network in Ohio.
